We are working towards achieving the following goals in the long run by the help of Allah the Almighty:

- 1. Every child to develop the love and connection with the Quran and have a protected time set aside daily at home to read the Ouran.
- 2. Every child that leaves the institution is to be Quran literate and is able to read the Quran fluently with Tarteel.
- 3. Every child that leaves the institution is to have memorised a minimum of Juz Amma (Juzz 30).

In order to achieve this and make the Quran Education Program successful, a joint effort from the school, students and parents is required.

On the school front we are making a major review of the current Iqra/ Quran curriculum as well as reorganising the structure of Quran classes. We are also employing additional Quran Instructors as well as Quran Intervention staff to provide better Quran teaching and learning experiences for the students and to ensure no child falls behind the minimum curriculum expectations.

We also require parents to support us at all year levels from Foundation till Secondary by ensuring students have 20 minutes of protected time daily at home to read their Quran homework 5 times as assigned by the Quran Instructor. Once this has been completed, please ensure your child's record book is being signed as an acknowledgement. May Allah The Almighty accept our efforts and give us *taufeeq* in achieving our goals.

Here are some sayings from the Prophet (peace and blessings be upon him) regarding the importance of learning the Quran:

Narrated Uthman (may Allah be pleased with him) that the Prophet (peace and blessings be upon him) said, "The best among you (Muslims) are those who learn the Qur'an and teach it." [Sahih al-Bukhari 5027]

Abdullah ibn Mas'ud (may Allah be pleased with him) reported that the Messenger of Allah (peace and blessings be upon him) said, "Whoever recites a letter from the Book of Allah will receive one good deed as ten good deeds like it. I do not say that *Alif Lam Mim* is one letter, but rather *Alif* is a letter, *Lam* is a letter, and *Mim* is a letter." [Sunan al-Tirmidhī 2910]

### **Child Safe Standards**

Children have the right to be safe and protected, including at school. Schools have the responsibility to keep children safe and have a legal requirements for the care, safety and welfare of students. Children's safety and well-being is an important and integral part of our school's vision and mission alongside the development of academic excellence and spiritual growth. In order to create and maintain a child safe organisation, all Victorian

schools must comply with Ministerial Order No 1359 - Implementing the Child Safety Standards - Managing the risk of child abuse in schools and school boarding premises. Schools need to meet the Child Safe Standards to achieve zero tolerance approach to child abuse. The Child Safe Standards are compulsory minimum standards for all Victorian early childhood services and schools, to ensure they are well prepared to protect children from abuse and neglect.

The Child Safe Standards require schools to consider all aspects of child safety and put measures in place to protect children from all forms of abuse, including:

- Sexual or grooming offences
- Physical violence
- Serious emotional or Psychological harm
- Serious neglect

Darul Ulum College as part of an educational institution is also obliged to ensure all these standards are in place and being implemented.

In the meantime, parents and carers are encouraged to explore the student well-being section on the parent portal on Schoolbox, the school's learning management system, for access to relevant policies pertaining to student well-being.

Parents are also encouraged to provide opportunities to discuss with their children in a safe and non-judgemental atmosphere about feeling safe and what to do if they have any concerns about their child's safety and well-being. Some conversation starters that you may use to ask your child if they feel safe include:

Do you know that you should always feel safe, no matter where you are?

Have you ever felt uncomfortable, worried or not safe? Who would you talk to if you feel unsafe, at school and at home?

What do you hope will happen if you tell someone you don't feel safe?

# Teach your child how to keep themselves safe

As your child gets older, they become increasingly independent and may spend time away from you or with a babysitter/carer. As part of the journey of growing up, it's important to speak to your child about being safe. Let them know:

### Tip 1

It's OK to say NO if they think what they're being asked to do is or feels wrong.

### Tip 2

If they feel they're in danger, it's OK to yell, scream, kick or run to a safe place that you and your child have both agreed on – such as a neighbour or friend.

### Tip 3

Make sure that you tell your child that you would never send a stranger to pick them up.

### Tip 4

They can tell a lie, even to an adult, if they need to get away from someone who makes them feel unsafe.

### Tip 5

To use a 'code' word you both have agreed on, to let you know they're not feeling safe; as an example, using your first name when talking to you on the phone.

### Tip 6

Their body is their own – once a child no longer needs nappies to be changed or help with toileting, a carer or any other person should not touch their private areas.

### Tip 7

To tell you or another adult if they have any problems or if someone is making them feel unsafe.

### Tip 8

A babysitter or any other adult should not ask a child to keep a secret.

### Tip 9

Not to give out personal information online, including their school, suburb, sporting team or nicknames and to never meet someone they have met online in person.


# Fortnightly Islamic Themes Program - A focus on training and awakening Mindful Muslims

### Secondary Girls Campus



### 3D Shapes by 2A students





Ayesha: I like Menaal because she is always near me when I'm sad or scared. We like each other.


Maryam: Fatima is helpful and kind. She is a very good friend. If I'm sad, she asks me what happened and cheers me up. She shares things I need.




### **Year 9 Science**

As part of the topic 'components of an ecosystem', students learnt about adaptations. They worked in small groups to create 'an organism' by showing its various structural, behavioural and functional adaptations.

Students also conducted an experiment on enzyme activity of amylase. The image below shows the results using Tes Tape strips to check if the starch used in the experiment was converted to glucose in the presence of amylase.









### **Photosynthesis and Anaerobic Respiration Practical**

Year 11 Biology students have been learning about the processes involved in transport across membrane. To consolidate their learning they investigated different factors that affect the rate of diffusion including temperature and concentration of solutes in solution.





Year 12 Biology students have also conducted a number of practicals in Term 1 related to enzymes, photosynthesis and anaerobic respiration. Students investigated the effects of increasing bicarbonate solution on the rate of photosynthesis as well as the effects of temperature on yeast fermentation.








The Year 12 Biology girls also consolidated their understanding of complex biological concepts by modelling the process of protein synthesis. They demonstrated their creativity skills with a group presentation and came up with their own questions to assess their peers understanding engaging way. It was a fun way of revising an abstract biological concept.









Student reflection: Doing the photosynthesis and anaerobic respiration practical was a fun and entertaining experiment we have done this year. By doing them I've come to understand that photosynthesis is not only important for the plant's survival but the very essence of us to breathe as they supply us with the oxygen they produce when conducting photosynthesis and simultaneously produce their source of food, glucose. Similarly, with anaerobic respiration, everyday functioning and movement depend on the amount of energy we have, an important biochemical reaction that is important to muscle function but also for plants to receive all the energy for growth and development just like humans. These biochemical reactions are the very entity of human survival. We should appreciate these small things and their big influences as they are spectacular sights, and gifts given by Allah SWT. ## Darul Ulum College of Victoria

### **UNIFORM POLICY**

Darul Ulum College requires all students to wear the College assigned uniform correctly. There are two types of uniforms for primary and secondary students which are defined as:

- 1) Daily Uniform; and
- 2) Sports Uniform

Students must present themselves in a neat and tidy manner at all times. The College expects that uniforms are clean and in good condition and that uniforms are of an appropriate size for the student.

The policy is categorised into two sections: 1) Foundations - Year Four and 2) Year Five - Year Twelve. Details for each category are outlined below.

### **POLICY GUIDELINES**

- 1. Students must wear the complete Daily Uniform on all days except on days when PE is timetabled.
- 2. Students must come to school wearing the complete Sports Uniform on PE days.
- 3. Students must wear black school shoes or black runners on all days. Black runners must be worn for PE classes.
- 4. Black or navy gloves, shawl/neck scarf may be worn on cold days.
- 5. Parents are advised to label all uniform items with their child's name.
- 6. Make-up, nail polish and jewellery are not allowed to be worn.
- 7. Hairstyles must be simple, not coloured and of one size all around. Boys' hair must not exceed the earlobe from the back.

### **POLICY GUIDELINES**

- 1. The blazer\* is a **compulsory** item that must be worn to school every day of the week. Students may remove the blazer after the morning assembly.
- 2. Students must wear the complete Daily Uniform every day of the week.
- 3. Students must wear the complete Daily Uniform for formal College events as required by the College.
- 4. Black school shoes or black runners must be worn every day of the week.
- 5. Students without white socks may be issued with a pair of white socks by the school and the cost will be added to the student's fee.
- 6. Students without white under-scarf cap will be issued with the item by the school and the cost will be added to the student's fee.
- 7. Sports Uniform must be worn during PE periods and sporting events along with black runners.
- 8. Students must bring their Sports Uniforms in their bags to change for their PE classes. Black runners must be worn during PE classes. Daily Uniforms must be worn after the PE classes immediately.
- 9. Black or navy gloves, shawl/neck scarf may be worn on cold days.
- 10. Hairstyles must be simple, not coloured and of one size all around. Boys' hair must not exceed the earlobe from the back.
- 11. Make-up, nail polish and jewellery are not allowed to be worn.

\*Year 5 students only will have the option of purchasing the blazer from the school directly at a subsided price. This initiative is subject to change by the senior management without prior notice.

NOTE: ALL UNIFORM ITEMS MUST BE MANUFACTURED BY THE COLLEGE'S SERVICE PROVIDER, PSW, EXCEPT FOR THE ELASTIC WAIST SCHOOL PANTS (PROVIDED THEY ARE NAVY BLUE IN COLOUR\*), BAGS, SHOES AND SOCKS.

\*Tracksuits, jeans and traditional pants are not approved school pants.

### **UNIFORM FOLLOW-UP PROCEDURE**

- 1. The Level Coordinator / Form Teacher identifies students without the approved uniform.
- 2. Students without approved uniform will be referred to the office to contact parents informing them that the child must be picked up, unless the uniform can be dropped off at school.
- 3. If parent confirms bringing the uniform, the child may return to class until the uniform arrives.
- 4. Parents who are not contactable and/or unable to pick up the student by the end of period 1, the student will be isolated from the class whereby the relevant Level Coordinator (or another Level Coordinator within the same sub-school) will:
  - assign them to a class of the <u>same</u> year level; (male campus: students will be referred to one year above)
  - email relevant teachers about the student's transfer to the other class of the same year level; and
  - inform the parent accordingly.

This isolation process excludes Foundation students.
